

Orchids at Holman's Wood, Harcombe Cross

The verges and woodland at Holman's Wood and around the A38 junction have a beautiful array of wild flowers that grow on lime-rich soil. This is one of the most important sites in Devon for wild orchids, which flower in succession during spring and summer. Members of **Chudleigh** *Wild* census the orchids and other flowers every year.

We hope you enjoy our orchids, but please tread carefully (and do not pick the flowers!).



Early Purple Orchid

The earliest species to flower, in April-May. The stem is red at the top and leaves have dark blotches.



Common Spotted Orchid

Like the Early Purple, this has dark spots on the leaves, but flowers later, in June-July. The flowers are pinker and have delicate purple markings.



Greater Butterfly Orchid

Flowers mainly in June. The most notable species here, with over 1000 spikes (flower heads) in some years. Some plants grow to 40 cm in height.



Bee Orchid

Flowers in June-July. Has only a few flowers that resemble furry insects. Several grow opposite the office at Holman's Wood.
